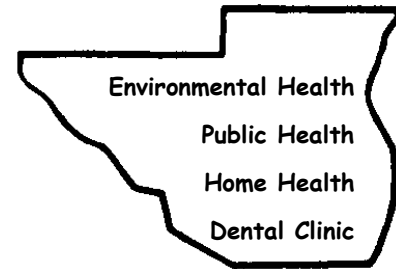

To the Citizens of Pike County:

This report is an abbreviated summary of services provided by Pike County Health Department (PCHD) for the Fiscal Year, December 2014 through November 2015. A full report is available on the PCHD website at www.pikecoilhealth.org.

2015 was a challenging year for local health departments (LHDs) in Illinois as the state budget remained in limbo. The 97 LHDs in Illinois that serve 5.5 million people, more than 2 of every 5 Illinoisans, are struggling to serve their communities due to the budget impasse. Rural health departments are particularly hit hard. Many LHDs have had to lay-off staff, reduce the length of the work week, reduce hours of operation, and/or reduce services.

Illinois has under-funded its public health system for years. In fact, PCHD has been reducing hours of operation, staff, and programming for more than 5 years in response to decreased and delayed funding. In 2010, to reduce expenses, PCHD closed to the public on Friday's and mandated furlough days for Public Health staff based on fiscal needs and program demands. Essential services, such as those provided by Environmental Health and Communicable Disease, as well as Home Health, were staffed on Fridays.

State funds account for nearly 40% of our \$2m budget. Therefore, as a result of the current state budget crisis, PCHD increased mandatory furlough days for Public Health staff, including Administration, Environmental Health, and Communicable Disease. The lack of a state budget is eroding our ability to provide service that are vital to the public's health and mandated by state law. These services include restaurant inspections, regulation of private sewage systems, investigation of disease outbreaks and immunization against communicable diseases.

As we move forward into our 50th year of providing services for Pike County, the future of the local public health system in Illinois is uncertain. With staff reductions and the exhaustion of cash reserves and lines of credit, the public health system is losing its capacity to protect the public and respond adequately to public health emergencies like cases of measles and mumps in other counties, Legionnaires' disease in Adams County and the Cryptosporidium outbreak this past fall. Public Health services benefit every citizen. Assuring the conditions in which people can be healthy, like public safety and public education, is a fundamental government responsibility. IAPHA, IPHA and others are working hard to encourage the passage of a budget. PCHD has reached out to state legislators and the governor. We greatly appreciate the support of the staff, advisory committees, the BOH, the County Board, other elected officials and community partners during these tumultuous times. We will strive to assure that high quality public health, home health and oral health services are available to all citizens of Pike County.

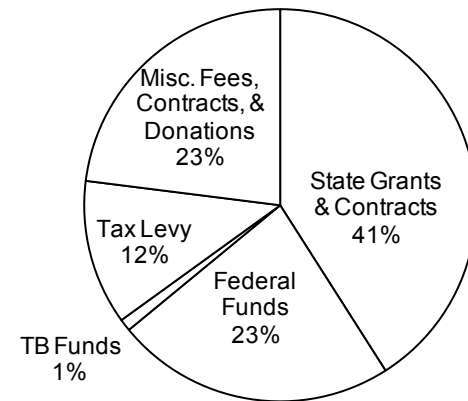

- Promotes and encourages healthy behaviors
- Responds to disasters and assists communities in recovery
- Assures the quality and accessibility of health services

Essential Public Health Services

- Monitor health status to identify community health problem
- Diagnose and investigate health problems and health hazards in the community
- Inform, educate, and empower people about health issues
- Mobilize community partnerships to identify and solve health problems
- Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts
- Enforce laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety
- Link people to needed personal health services and assure the provision of health care when otherwise unavailable
- Assure a competent public health and personal health care workforce
- Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of personal and population based health services
- Research for new insights and innovative solutions to health problems
